

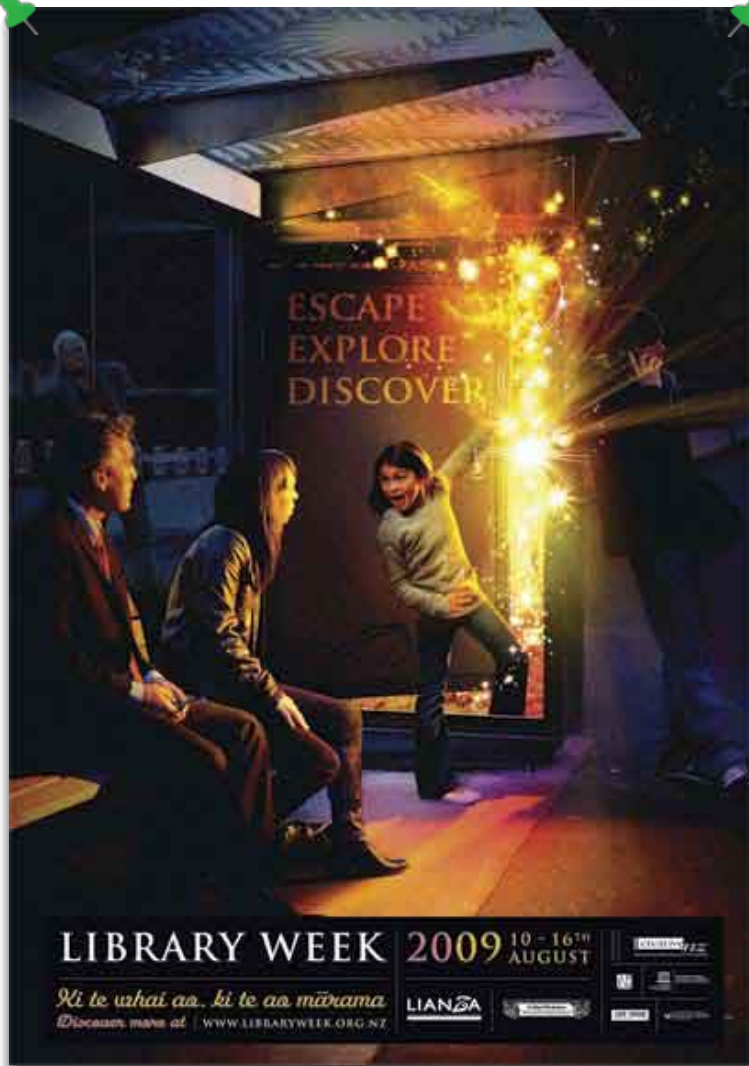

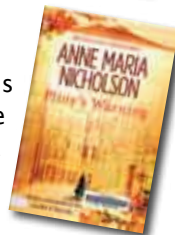
The eighth book in the Cedar Cove series. This one features the pastor but you can catch up with the other residents too.

Henning Mankell

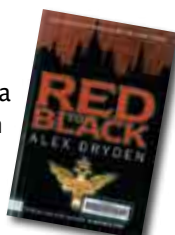

Alex Dryden

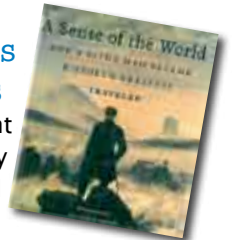

a memoir by writer, mountaineer, campaigner, explorer and historian - Philip Temple

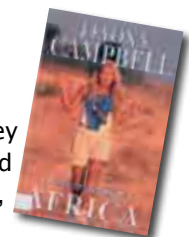
An account of how Philip Temple left England to make New Zealand his home and of his many adventures both here and overseas.

Ffyoona Campbell

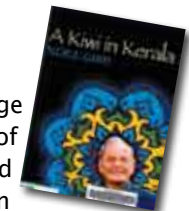
A gripping account of an astonishing journey from Cape Town to Morocco. Ffyoona walked 31 miles a day for 2 years through rainforest, jungle and desert.

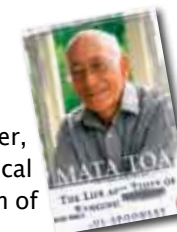
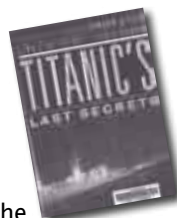
Grey ghosts:

LIANZA Children's Book Awards

Library Week opens on August 10th with the LIANZA Children's Book Awards Ceremony. The Awards including New Zealand's longest-running book award, the LIANZA Esther Glen Award, are for excellence in literature, illustration, non-fiction and te reo Maori. All the judges are librarians who firmly believe reading and good books are the code to unlocking any child's hidden potential. The finalists of the LIANZA Children's Book Awards are a true celebration of New Zealand writers and illustrators. Some of the finalists to look out for are described here. The books selected all fit with the Library Week theme of Escape Explore Discover.

LIANZA Esther Glen Award (Fiction) *Juno of Taris by Fleur Beale.*

Juno lives on an island, not just any island as it is protected by a special dome designed to ensure the survival of the community. Juno is desperate to find out about life outside the dome but to question the ways of Taris is discouraged and dangerous. Will Juno break the rules and what will be the consequence of her doing so?



LIANZA Russell Clark Award (Illustration) *Oliver goes exploring by Margaret Beames and Sue Hitchcock.*

A picture book about the adventures of Oliver, the irresistible, inquisitive black cat. Oliver wriggles through a hole in the fence and discovers all sorts of interesting creatures in the next-door garden.



LIANZA Elsie Locke Award (Non Fiction) *Atoms, dinosaurs and DNA: 68 great New Zealand scientists by Veronica Medina and Rebecca Priestly.*

By presenting short biographies of each scientist in chronological order this book charts the history of science in New Zealand over the past two centuries. It begins with Joseph Banks and Daniel Solander who conducted the first scientific investigation of New Zealand's natural history one hundred and forty years ago and ends with Stephen Tauwhare who is researching possible uses and health benefits of indigenous plants and animals.



Te Kura Pounamu (te reo Maori) *Hinemoa te toa by Tim Tipene and John Bennett.*

Hinemoa is not afraid of anything but even Hinemoa needs some fear. When the time comes to learn to swim she is too impatient and jumps in the deep end and has to be rescued. Then Nana has to show her how to listen to her fears and start at the shallow end and learn to swim properly.



New Zealand's Biggest Story Time

It's here again! Come and celebrate Library Week on Wednesday 12 August with New Zealand's Biggest Story Time. All over New Zealand libraries will have their story time at the same time so we can all join in this event. The book this year is *Itiiti's gift* by Melanie Drewery, illustrated by Fifi Colson.

Itiiti's Gift is the story of a girl who feels clumsy and shy next to the rest of her family who are loud and tall and good at things. Itiiti doesn't think she is good at anything, but her mother tells her that she will find a gift of her own. Itiiti sets out to find it and to her surprise, her gift finds her! It is a story about self-discovery as Itiiti explores her talents and finds her place in the whanau/community.

This book fits in very well with the overall theme of library week of exploring and discovering things about yourself and the world around you. So come along to a **bookinopolis** near you for 30 minutes of storytelling and fun. Starts at 10.30.
